Covid important update

Cases of COVID 19 are increasing both nationally and locally and the alert level in the UK has been raised to level 4.

Further measures have been enforced in England as part of Plan B to try to control the spread of coronavirus including a requirement for people to wear face masks in a wider range of indoor spaces including in communal areas in schools.

We are working hard in school to protect our school community and we encourage everyone to remain vigilant to support us in protecting our vulnerable children and young people. In order to help protect everyone the following are important:

- Vaccinations – All adults and some children are being offered the vaccine.
 - Adults with Down's syndrome are more likely to get poorly from coronavirus than other people as well as those with health conditions such as heart conditions, some brain conditions and breathing problems such as asthma.
 - Vaccines don't completely stop everyone from getting coronavirus but they help to give good protection against your child getting seriously ill. Vaccinating children can also help stop the spread of COVID-19, including in schools.

 - Testing - Testing remains important in reducing the risk of transmission of infection within schools.

- It is strongly encouraged that parents support children and young people to test twice weekly if they are in year 7 or above with an LFD.
- It is also strongly encouraged that parents (and other visitors) take an LFD test themselves before entering the school for appointments.
- Testing is particularly important when children and young people return in January following the break as some children and young people may have coronavirus but not show any symptoms or are unable to tell us if they feel unwell.

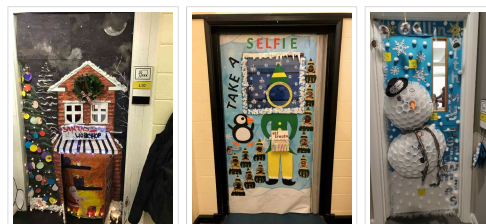

To prepare the learners for the changes they may see around them during this time of year we encourage each class to take part in a creative project by decorating their classroom doors.

Pupils and staff have worked together to produce fantastic contributions to our annual Christmas Door Competition! We are lucky to have so many creatively talented people at Calthorpe and Belgravia who have brought the Christmas atmosphere alive in our corridors!

With so many marvellous displays (..and competitive people!) around school, we knew the competition would be difficult to judge, and this was the perfect job for our student council!

The winning classes as voted by members of our student council were L10 and FB3. These were the displays that the learners interacted with the most and both classes won a £100 classroom resources voucher each!

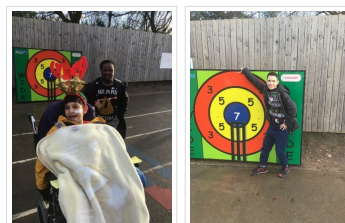

friends on the inflatable fun run, ball pit and inside of the inflatable disco dome!

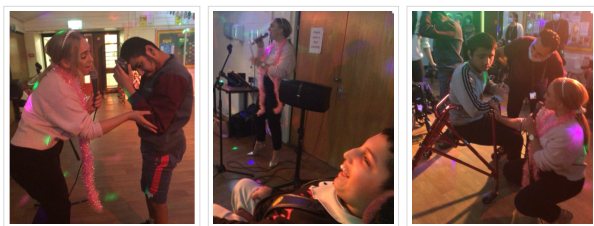

Finally, we were able to celebrate all of our achievements this term so far with a visit from Loula singing familiar Christmas songs.

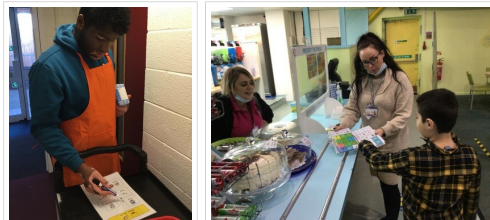

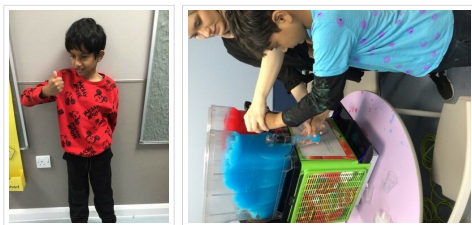

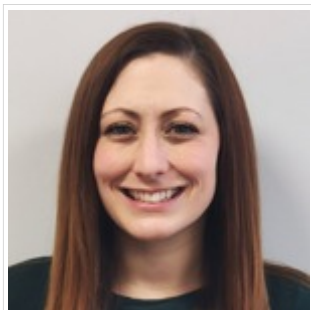

We are looking forward to celebrating and raising awareness for more events in our Personal Development calendar in the Spring Term.



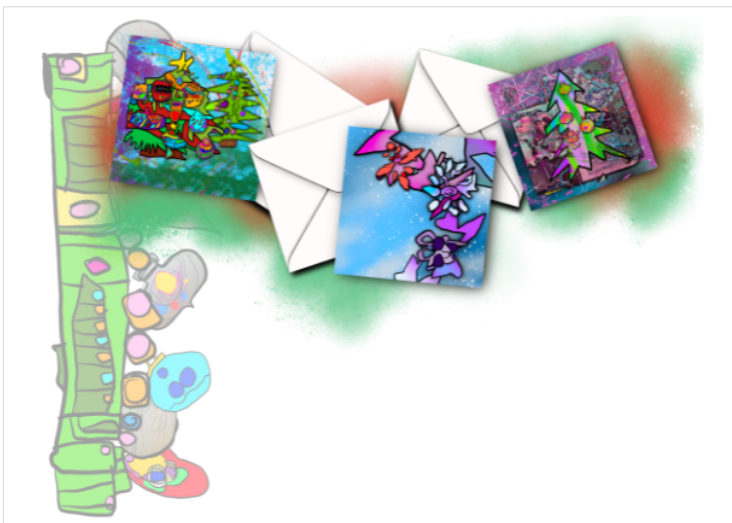

Art - Autumn 2021

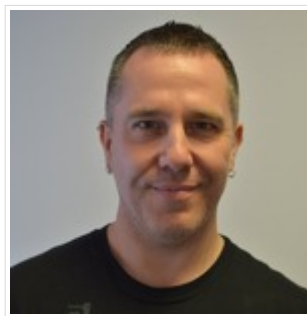
Throughout this term, Students' from both the Learning and Foundation for life pathways have been creating

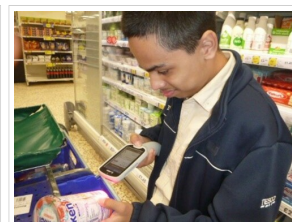
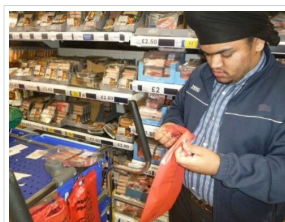

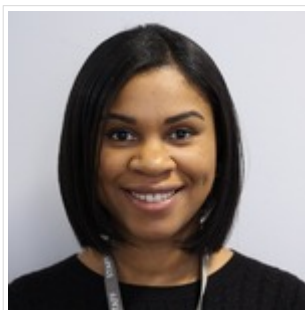
